Cornell Tech, part of Cornell University, offers the groundbreaking <u>Clinic to End Tech Abuse (CETA)</u>. We help domestic violence survivors end technology-related abuse -- and we're looking for **new remote volunteers**.

Our clinic partners with the New York City Mayor's Office to End Domestic and Gender-Based Violence (ENDGBV) to help survivors detect and prevent technology-related abuse such as cyberstalking and spyware. We also do research to create a better understanding of tech abuse.

As a volunteer, you will:

- Join a friendly, supportive team and be a part of exciting work at Cornell Tech.
- Receive remote training on domestic violence, technology-related abuse, and client interaction skills.
- Help domestic violence survivors directly.
- Contribute to cutting-edge research.

Please note: This volunteer role is unpaid.

Time commitment:

As a volunteer, you will need to complete an interview process and approximately 10 hours of remote training via Zoom. You will also have a "shadowing" period when you will listen in as more experience volunteers help clients.

After you complete your training, we would expect you to be available for at least 8 hours per month to meet remotely with domestic violence survivors and attend clinic meetings.

Qualifications:

We encourage applications from two types of volunteers: (1) those with strong computer science qualifications, and (2) those who do not have a computer science background but are comfortable navigating privacy settings and have other relevant skills.

All applicants should have:

 An understanding of basic computer security or online privacy concepts, or a willingness to learn.

- The ability to explain technical concepts to people with little technical knowledge clearly, simply, and respectfully.
- Empathy, strong listening skills, and strong organizational skills.
- A commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion, human rights, and being a team player.
- Fluency in a language other than English is a plus, although not required.

We work with survivors in New York City, but you can be based anywhere.
